We now have two hundred three completed quilts for 2020, this is 58 per cent of our goal of 350.

We are still accepting UFO's for community relations, please include the patten if it is needed to finish the quilt.

Since I have been on "lock down" I have been cutting kits, lots of kits. We now not only have plenty of kits; but we also have quilts that need quilting, quilts that need binding.

We now have our new shipment of labels, so if anyone needs some, please get in touch with me.

I am attaching a pattern called Wheels and some handy hints on binding.

Two new patterns and a lesson on binding have been included in this newsletter which you may use for Community Relations Quilts. See the last pages.

Sewing quilts from the QBS kits

• Before you start sewing a kit, take a minute to quickly read through the directions. If there is anything you don't understand, call Randy Miller or Jo Melis before you start cutting/sewing. Once you've cut something incorrectly, it's very hard to recover as the kits do not contain a large amount of extra fabric to correct mistakes.

 \cdot Be sure to trim off the selvages before sewing! Selvage material shrinks at a different rate than the "real" part of the fabric and should NOT be used.

• Please do NOT piece the borders on the diagonal! The kits do not allow any extra fabric to do this.

 \cdot Read how the borders are supposed to be sewn on. Sometimes you will need to sew all the border pieces together before sewing them to the quilt or you will run out of border fabric. These directions will be at the bottom of the pattern.

• If the pattern says sew the border to top and bottom, then sew on sides, do that. Usually the patterns are constructed so that a single strip can be used for the top (and one for the bottom) IF those borders are done first. If there are 3 strips left (for a kid's quilt), sew them together before sewing them to the sides. If there are 4 border strips left, sew 2 together for one side and 2 together for the other side.

• Do NOT add extra rows or borders to make the quilt bigger. The fabric for the binding and backing has been carefully calculated for the size given. If you start adding "extras", the backing and binding that was selected specifically to match that quilt can't be used. Not only can't the proper backing be used, a new make-shift backing that may not look as nice will have to be found. Sometimes the original backing can't even be reused unless it is cut into little strips.

• Binding strips CAN (and should) be sewn together diagonally. This reduces bulk, so it is the preferred method. The pattern requirements for binding take into consideration the extra fabric needed for diagonally piecing. However, you can sew the binding with straight seams if you are uncomfortable with the preferred method. Come to one of the Community Relations sew days and someone there will be happy to show you how to sew binding strips properly!

Sewing quilts with your own fabric/pattern

Baby/kids

 \cdot Good sizes for baby/kid's quilts are 40" x 52-56". If you keep the width to 40", you don't have to piece the backing!

· If you are making a kid's quilt, please try to select kid-friendly prints and bright, happy colors.

 \cdot Kid's quilts will be washed a lot, so save the extra-fancy techniques for when you make your own quilt. You will appreciate it a lot more than they will.






Perfect Fit Binding Technique

Follow these steps exactly for easy, attractive binding with no bumpy seam joinings to be hand sewn.


- Lay your 2 1/2" binding strips <u>right-</u> side down on your cutting mat.
- Use the 45 degree mark on your rotary ruler to trim the left end of your strips. Make sure you cut the angle as shown below:




 Trim the other end of the binding strips at the same angle. The strips should look like this:




- Sew all the strips together, so that you have one long strip.
- Fold the binding in half lengthwise and press. (If you roll up the binding around your fist after it is ironed, it will be easier to work with.) Now it will look like this:




 Leaving a 8" tail and using a 1/4" seam, start sewing your binding to the right side of your quilt. Stop when you are 1/4" away from the first corner.




7. Sew off the quilt diagonally.



Fold the binding to the right on the sewn diagonal line.




 Now fold it back on itself and continue sewing down the second side.




Perfect Fit Binding Technique


 Repeat process on all 4 corners. When you are sewing the final side, stop when you are about 8" away from the starting end of the binding.




11. Pin down the edge of the binding that you just finished sewing until it is underneath the 8" piece you left loose when you started. Now, with the starting piece <u>on top</u>, pin down the starting 6" of binding.




 Use chalk or a water-soluble marker to draw a line along the diagonal edge.



 Remove the pins and open out the top piece of the binding. Use a ruler to extend the line all the way across the binding.



 Use the ruler again to draw another line 1/2" <u>BELOW</u> this line. Make sure you are <u>adding</u> 1/2" to the length of the binding! This is for the seam allowances.



 Cut the binding on the second line. Place the binding edges right sides together, pin, and sew using a 1/4" seam allowance.




- Trim off the points and finger-press the seam open.
- Refold the binding and finish sewing to the quilt. The binding will fit perfectly.

Easy Wagon Wheels (58 x 74)

Cut

Do not move the pieces until all the following cuts have been made: Cut on both diagonal lines



Repeat with rest of squares and press open. Each set of 10" squares will yield eight 1/2 square triangles. Un-finished size of each 1/2 square triangle is approximately 4-1/2".

Arrange

Selecting the triangles at random, arrange them into blocks of 4 with the lights and darks placed as follows




Sew

on the first page and sew in rows (i.e. 3 blocks across and 4 blocks down). Sew all the inside borders together, then sew to sides, top, and bottom. Repeat for the outside border. Use the picture above to arrange and sew the blocks of four into 12 larger blocks. Arrange the 12 larger blocks as shown






