I am really excited about 2021 and our upcoming zoom speakers.



Add another step, and you can sew the blocks for an entire quilt in individual accordions that come together almost like magic. It's the coolest thing I've ever come up with (if I do say) and you'll see the quilts from my book "Oompah! Jazz Up Your Scrap Quilts With the Accordion Sewn HSTs Method" plus a few surprise treats. You'll want to pick up your accordion and join the oompah sensation!

The magic of movement in quilts

Why should we worry about creating movement in our compositions? Interest. While color, pattern, and workmanship create beauty, movement creates interest. It's a guaranteed "wow factor" and adds certain sophistication. We can create it using appliqué, adjusting a composition, incorporating asymmetrical shapes, and unique border treatments. In writing patterns for over 20 years I've seen how movement in a composition absolutely draws people in. I'll show you lots of unique ways to create it often with a bit of humor that seems to just delight.

This presentation of a quilt to Scott Noble at SewVac took place in December - as a thank you for all his support for the guild. The quilt was made by Kate Weber and quilted by Sandy Carreon. Scott drew the winning ticket for the Opportunity Quilt. The quilt was then turned around to reveal this quilt that was pinned to the back of the Opportunity Quilt to surprise him with it. A video of the presentation was streamed at the December Zoom meeting.



2021 Block of the Month Kate Weber

I have an idea that may entice folks to participate. (Warning a brain fart: could be genius idea or a real stinker! LOL)



this is

Have a monthly block pattern published in the newsletter for members to download and print. (Can be mailed to those who need it.)

Members make the block and mail it/drop it off before the next guild Zoom meeting. For every block made, the maker gets a ticket. At the meeting, we pull a name and that person gets all the blocks that have been made. [If there are lots of blocks, divide them up and pull that many names.] Additional blocks each get an additional ticket.

People participate for the months they feel like it. If they don't want to, no sweat.

For fund raising purposes, ask for \$3/month to be eligible to participate in the drawing for that month-if no fee included, we keep the block for CR quilts. Or a flat rate of \$10/year to be "Rockin' the Block." [Too corny? Probably] The money can be included with the block when mailed or dropped off.

Here's another part of the brain fart: the blocks could be tied to the speakers' topic the month before, or a holiday for the month when the blocks will be drawn. For example: in January newsletter ask for valentine related blocks: could be hearts, red/pink fabrics, etc. After the Cathedral Window speaker, blocks would be mini-cathedral windows that can be joined together.

I just have these thoughts running around in my brain. What do you think?

SO... To quote President Elect Biden, "Here's the deal..."

BOM is strictly voluntary on a month by month basis, members sew a block based on a theme or pattern published in the newsletter. Blocks are dropped or mailed to Kate Weber by the Wednesday BEFORE the Zoom guild meeting (address on member roster).

Include the fundraising fee (\$3/month, one time \$10/year) to be eligible for drawing. Blocks received w/o fees will be part of the drawing. If you want to support Community Relations, then put that information with the block, and those blocks will not be included in the drawing and will be forwarded.

On your mark, get set, GO!

All blocks will be 10½"raw edge squares (10" finished).

January – Theme: snowflakes-blue background, light blues/white solid/prints flakes



February – Theme: Valentine's Day

Squares

cut: six 3" squares in heart colors

(scrappy is fine!) and

two 3"

squares of background

Half Square Triangles (HST)

cut: four 4" squares heart colors and four 4" squares of background, make: eight HSTs and trim to 3" squares

Assemble with ¼" seams as shown in photograph

Optional: include extra background fabric with your block so the winner(s) may assemble like the photo. Do not attach this fabric.

If you submit your quilt photo, it will be published in the next issue. Also, if you would like to share a quilt you have finished recently, or a work in progress please send the photos to nhjordan@msn.com with show and tell in the subject line and your project will be published in the July newsletter. Try to get them in by the 20th. Thank you to all who contributed, keep them coming for next month also. And now, contributions from our busy members.



Advice from a Singer Sewing Machine Manual from 1949

Prepare yourself mentally for sewing.

Think about what you are going to do. Never approach sewing with a sigh or lackadaisically. Good results are difficult when indifference dominates. Never try to sew with a sink full of dirty dishes or beds unmade.

When there are urgent housekeeping chores, do these first so that your mind is free to enjoy your sewing. When you sew, make yourself as attractive as possible. Put on a clean dress. Keep a little bag of French chalk near your sewing machine to dust your fingers at intervals. Have your hair in order, powder and lipstick put on. If you are constantly fearful that a visitor might drop in or your husband will come home, and you will not look neatly put together, you will not enjoy your sewing.

Orange Marmalade Recipe #2

Use least amount of processed sugar to satisfy your sugar taste.

5 Oranges 1 cup cane sugar 1/3 cup SugarLeaf or artificial sweetener Ball RealFruit Classic Pectin 10 tsp

Desired Result: Clear marmalade with suspended orange peels.

Squeeze juice from 5 oranges. Discard all Pulp. Strain juice.
Use a potato paring knife to peel the oranges. Discard the white part of peel.
Cutup the thin peel strips into small pieces.

Put orange juice and cutup peels into a sauce pan.

(The only part of the orange used: juice and peels).

Add 2 8oz jars of water.

Bring to a gentle boil. (No raging boil.)

After 10 minutes check the peels for softness you desire.

If ok add 1 cup sugar. Boil gently for 5 more minutes.

Add pectin. Boil for 5 more minutes.

Add artificial SugarLeaf sweetener. Boil for 2 minutes.

Put a teaspoon of marmalade on a plate and put it into the freezer.

Test it when it cools. If it is as thick as you want then discontinue boiling.

Place the marmalade into 8 oz jars and let cool. You are done.

Total time required: 10 minutes cutting, 22 minutes boiling.

SCOTTISH SHORT BREAD

1 cup sugar 1 pound butter 5 cups flour Cream sugar and butter until light and fluffy Add 1 cup of flour at a time BEATING WELL BEAT entire ingredients for 3 minutes until well blended.

Cut parchment paper to fit 4 cake pans. Place parchment paper in bottom of each pan.

Divide batter in 1/4s. Spread each 1/4 th evenly in bottom of each cake pan.

Bake at 275 degrees for 1 hour.

Remove from oven and let sit for 15 minutes. Slice short bread in 8 or 16 wedges.

Enjoy!! Serve!



Tips for Quilters

Make your own "BEST PRESS"! Mix 16 oz distilled water (from the supermarket) with 2 oz VODKA (yes, vodka! Hold the OJ!)

Put it into a spray bottle and use.

How does this work? Vodka is made from potatoes - a starch. And the fermentation/ distillation process makes it very pure. It not only stiffens, but it is unattractive to insects.



Perfect Fit Binding Technique

Follow these steps exactly for easy, attractive binding with no bumpy seam joinings to be hand sewn.

- Lay your 2 1/2" binding strips <u>right-side down</u> on your cutting mat.
- Use the 45 degree mark on your rotary ruler to trim the left end of your strips. Make sure you cut the angle as shown below:




Trim the other end of the binding strips at the same angle. The strips should look like this:

wrong side


- Sew all the strips together, so that you have one long strip.
- Fold the binding in half lengthwise and press. (If you roll up the binding around your fist after it is ironed, it will be easier to work with.) Now it will look like this:

right side


 Leaving a 8" tail and using a 1/4" seam, start sewing your binding to the right side of your quilt. Stop when you are 1/4" away from the first corner.




7. Sew off the quilt diagonally.



Fold the binding to the right on the sewn diagonal line.




Now fold it back on itself and continue sewing down the second side.




Perfect Fit Binding Technique


 Repeat process on all 4 corners. When you are sewing the final side, stop when you are about 8" away from the starting end of the binding.




11. Pin down the edge of the binding that you just finished sewing until it is underneath the 8" piece you left loose when you started. Now, with the starting piece on top, pin down the starting 6" of binding.




 Use chalk or a water-soluble marker to draw a line along the diagonal edge.



 Remove the pins and open out the top piece of the binding. Use a ruler to extend the line all the way across the binding.



14. Use the ruler again to draw another line 1/2" <u>BELOW</u> this line. Make sure you are <u>adding</u> 1/2" to the length of the binding! This is for the seam allowances.



 Cut the binding on the second line.
 Place the binding edges right sides together, pin, and sew using a 1/4" seam allowance.



- Trim off the points and finger-press the seam open.
- Refold the binding and finish sewing to the quilt. The binding will fit perfectly.

Speedy Burrito Pillowcases


Standard 20" x 30"















Materials:

 $\frac{3}{4}$ yd Main Pillowcase Fabric cut 27" x wof = 27 x 40-42 $\frac{1}{4}$ yd Cuff cut 9" x wof

1 1/2 to 3" wof Accent Fabric

For additional sizes

Queen and King use 7/8 yd Main Fabric. Same Cuff and accent Queen 20" x 33", King 20" x 36"

Directions:

- Place cuff fabric right side up. Layer the main pillowcase fabric on top of it, right side up, aligning the top raw edges. Fold accent fabric in half along long edge / lengthwise. Iron. Line up the raw edges of the folded accent strip with the top raw edges of the other two fabrics. (Note: Fabrics may not be same WOF. Keep on side even to allow minimal amount of trimming to one side.)
- Roll up main fabric by starting at the bottom and working your way up.
 Roll the main fabric panel into a little tube or "burrito." Stop when you get to the center of the cuff fabric.
- Bring the bottom edge of the cuff fabric up and over the burrito. Wrong side up. Align the raw edges. Pin in place, making sure to trap the accent strip. Stitch along the raw edges with a ¼" to 3/8" seam allowance, or use a serger to finish the edge. It should now look like a long fabric burrito.
- Unroll and Press by gently tugging and pulling at the main fabric inside the burrito out of the tube. Continue pulling your pillowcase from the inside out.
- Once it's fully unrolled, lay flat and press the wrinkles out, making sure the accent strip lays flat and in the same direction.
- 6. Trim the pillowcase to 28" (33" or 36") long, measuring from the top of the cuff to the opposite end. Then, fold the pillowcase in half, right sides together. Finger press any wrinkles out, and align the accent strip so each half is laying on top of the other. (If needed, you can pin it in place.) Trim the pillowcase to 20" wide (which will give you a 40" total width).
- Finish the Sides and Bottom of pillowcase in any one of the following ways.
 - a. French Seams: Fold the pillowcase in half, wrong sides together (right sides should be facing out). Stitch together with a ¼" seam allowance. (Note: You will only sew the two sides with raw edges.) Trim the raw edges down to a slim ¼".
 - b. Serger: Fold the pillowcase in half, then serge the raw edges on the top and right sides only. Turn right side out and press.
 - c. Overlock: Stitch side and bottom seams with either an overlock or regular machine. If using an overlock, bring the tread tail at the top of the cuff, back down between the cuff and the seam and zigzag over the seam allowance to secure the stitching.
- Turn. Press and fold.
